Presentations on the Battle of Gettysburg generally address tactics and strategy. This month's presentation will feature a discussion on the important role women played on the battlefield. Brad Gottfried will cover a variety of categories of women including: Residents (e.g. Ginny Wade, Mary McAllister, Elizabeth Thorn), Women who accompanied the armies (e.g., Rose Rooney, Lucinda Horne), Vivandieres (e.g., Mary Tepe, and Bridget Deavers), and Nurses (e.g., Elmira Spencer, Annie Etheridge). The role of the Sisters of Charity

Dr. Brad Gottfried has worked in higher education for almost forty years, since earned his Ph.D. in Zoology from Miami University in 1976. Beginning as a faculty member, he climbed the ranks to become President of Sussex County Community College in 2000 and since 2006, has been the President of the College of Southern Maryland. In his spare time, which is usually 3 a.m., Dr. Gottfried is a Civil War historian. He has ten books to his credit, including two brigade-level histories, four on Gettysburg, and four campaign atlases. The latter recount the major campaigns using maps. He has completed studies on First Bull Run, Antietam, Gettysburg, and Bristoe Station/Mine Run. His study of the Wilderness Campaign will be out in the fall and his is making good progress on his study of the Fredericksburg Campaign.

Hopefully the Roundtable Raffle has helped you round out your own Civil War reference library. Judy England has given us a generous selection of some very

nice books to use for our Raffle. Thank you Judy! I'm featuring two this month:

How better to gain an understanding of the War than by reading a journal kept by a soldier on either side. Stephen Sears has edited the wartime journals of a man from Michigan who served from Bull Run to Knoxville. Charles Haydon, a young lawyer, rose from a Sergeant to Lt. Colonel in his 3 years of service, finally succumbing to pneumonia in March 1864.

My second selection ties in with a local landmark.

Other first-hand accounts of the War were written amidst the shots & shells for immediate publication by the many Union and Rebel newspapers. These men sent back the eagerly awaited (but dreaded) accounts that the folks at home on each side craved. Often in peril's way as much as were their subjects, war correspondents put their lives at risk to get "The Story". The accounts of these 19th century 'Scud Studs' can be found in Ian Beckett's book.

As the saying goes "April showers bring May flowers". My arms are outstretched to embrace all welcome signs of Spring. This winter has tarried too long for my liking. The evening will also include recognition of partners involved in the Civil War sesquicentennial. Frederick residents illuminated the city in April 1865 to mark the end of the war, and following Mr. Swanson's talk, participants will be invited to take part in a special 150th anniversary illumination.
