**Presentation Overview: presentation “The Pratt Street Riot of 1861”**

This month's FB Live/ZOOM FCCWRT presentation tells the story of the 6<sup>th</sup> Massachusetts Militia, the first to leave the Bay State and answer their President's call to war. It was their journey to Washington that would place them in history as the route required passing through Baltimore, a place not welcoming to Union troops. To pass through the city, the men would have to traverse the gauntlet between Presidents Street Station on the east side of the harbor, and Camden Station on the west side, a distance of just over a mile.

On April 19, 1861, that journey across town would produce the first blood in the four-year war. Blood not on a battlefield, but on Pratt Street in Baltimore left by dead and wounded on both sides of the melee.

This program will detail the events leading to the conflict in the streets and the immediate aftermath including Ben Butler's instalment of a fort on Federal Hill overlooking the city, and the new battle between Lincoln and Chief Justice Roger B. Taney over the arrest of Maryland citizens.

**BIO: Mr. Bill Hallett;** He's a past president of the Civil War Roundtable of New Hampshire and current board member of the Civil War Roundtable of the Merrimack in Salisbury, Massachusetts. In 2010, Bill and his wife Liz, began, "Footsteps of Heroes: Civil War Walking Tour of Newburyport." The 90 min walking tour was a test for some of the stories for his book *Newburyport and the Civil War* (History Press 2012). Bill's radio career has included Baltimore, MD; York/Harrisburg, PA; Portsmouth, NH; and Boston, MA; along with places in between. But while in York, PA, a co-worker introduced Bill in 1994 to the world of reenacting. In recent years, Bill's been appearing as a war correspondent for living histories and doing less soldiering. He has spoken to audiences on various Civil War topics including a number of Civil War Roundtables throughout New England, the John Greenleaf Whittier Home, Newburyport Literary Festival, Gettysburg 153th Reenactment, and various historical societies, museums and organizations.

Newburyport, Massachusetts is Bill's home, along with his wife Elizabeth, who is equally as passionate about history and the Civil War. The couple often use free time to research history and family genealogy or travel to historic locations. They each have two grandsons and enjoy grandparent time, stressing stories about history.

# In Case You Missed it



Last month Mr. Logan Metesh addressed the roundtable, hosted by our strategic partner, the National Museum for Civil War Medicine on FB Live/ZOOM. Logan delighted over 20 ZOOM participants with the life story of Mr. James Henry Burton *"The Most Influential Man in the (Gun) World: James Henry Burton"*. He recounted the storied career of this famous Civil War Era gun manufacturer, from his time at Harpers Ferry, to later travels and

employment in England producing an astonishing 75,000 rifles per year at the Enfield Factory. The precision with which he was able to manufacture weapons and parts was to an astonishing .0003 of an inch, bringing him significant notoriety. An early career invention was for a munition intended to increase accuracy by virtue of a concave bottom which would seal to rifling, were it not for politics what would later be called the Minie Ball would be the Burton Ball. His work for the south during the Civil War after his return home to Virginia was significant, culminating in the standup of a factory in Georgia target to produce at the famed 75,000 rifle rate. Circumstances with importing from overseas near the end of the war prevented this industrial capability from ever coming to pass.

## November Book Report by Matt Borders

### REVIEW:

Joseph Harsh, *Sounding the Shallows: A Confederate Companion for the Maryland Campaign of 1862*. 280 pp. Notes, Charts, \$18.00 (paperback-currently out of print)

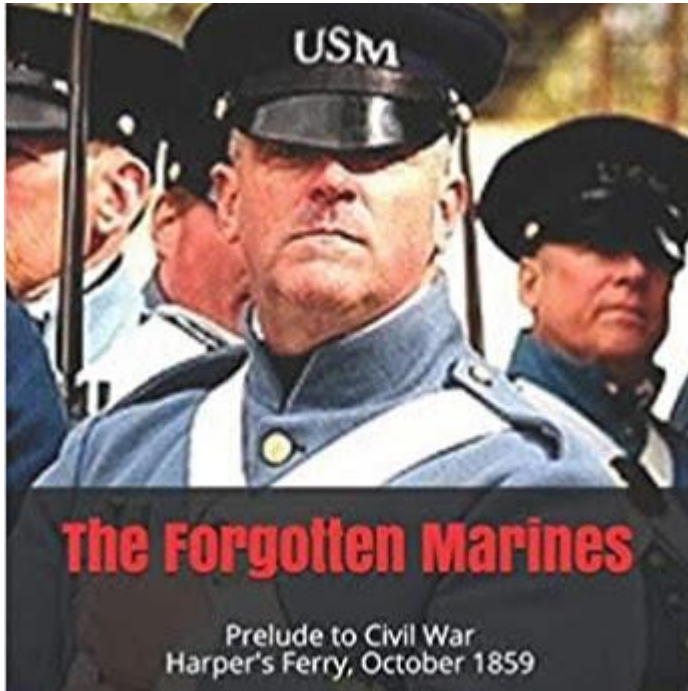
I was recently involved in a writing project with some of the Antietam Battlefield Guides and utilized one of the great lesser known resources for researching the 1862 Maryland Campaign. Dr. Joseph Harsh's *Sounding the Shallows*. For those of you who read up on the Maryland Campaign, Dr. Harsh's name will ring a few bells. He was the author of the seminal work, *Taken at the Flood: Robert E. Lee and Confederate Strategy in the Maryland Campaign of 1862*. A brilliant work that not only challenged some of the traditional interpretations of the campaign and battle of Antietam, but gave a very fair view of McClellan and the Federal response to the First Confederate Invasion of the North. That book was a massive effort, and is often the case, there was a lot of information, especially technical data, that was left out to accommodate publisher concerns such as page and word counts.

That is where *Sounding the Shallows* comes in. Published a year after *Taken at the Flood*, this companion work takes on a lot of the data information that had to be left out of the main volume. Want to know the combat experience of a regiment or other command in the Army of Northern Virginia going into the Maryland Campaign? This is for you. How about an analysis of the troop strength of the various regiments involved in the campaign? That's here too. How about the all-important question of combat strength of the Confederate army both before and after the campaign? Also addressed, along with many, many more topics you may not have even thought to ask about.

One of my favorite aspects of *Sounding the Shallows*, is the weather data. Come to find out there is very good weather data for the entire campaign from two very good sources. The regional almanac and the Frederick weather station. The weather station in particular took temperature, precipitation, wind direction and strength, as well as barometer readings several times a day. The data on each of these days is then backed up with first person accounts from the men involved in the campaign. This was a brilliant way to present what could honestly be very dry material to write about.

# CWI Conference 2021 Registration is Now OPEN

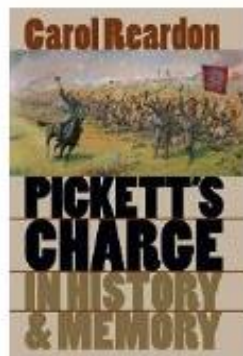


## 2021 Conference Registration is Now OPEN

Focusing primarily on the Gettysburg Campaign, [the 2021 conference](#) will feature lectures and battlefield tours exploring the battle from a variety of angles, including military leadership, civilian experiences, Lincoln's visit to Gettysburg, the commemorative landscape, and battlefield artifacts. The conference will also include special sessions on political disputes within the Army of the Potomac, drug addiction in the Civil War, race and Civil War memory in the literature of William Faulkner, the future of interpreting Confederate monuments, slave kidnappings, and more.

Speakers will include Gary W. Gallagher and Kent Masterson Brown, with battlefield tours led by Garry Adelman, Jennifer Murray, and an impressive lineup of expert National Park Service rangers and Licensed Battlefield Guides! This year's tours will take a new direction and follow individual regiments from battlefield to field hospital, with special visits to some of the lesser-known historic farms in Gettysburg which housed scores of wounded soldiers in the wake of the battle and which still stand today.
