Presentation Overview: The Lost Gettysburg Address

Few remember Edward Everett's oration that preceded Lincoln's famous address, but hardly anyone is aware of Kentucky native Charles Anderson's oration, which concluded the day's events. The speech was never published, and the lost manuscript only recently uncovered at a ranch in Wyoming. Dixon argues that the three featured speeches of November 19, 1863 need to be viewed as a rhetorical ensemble to better understand the political

context of the Gettysburg dedication.

The back story to this is the saga of Anderson himself, a slaveholder

who sacrificed nearly everything to help Lincoln save the Union. An escapee from a Confederate prison in Texas, he became Lincoln's emissary to Great Britain. He then nearly died commanding a Union regiment at Stones River. He eventually became governor of Ohio. His wartime exploits abound with intrigue and adventure.

**BIO:** David Dixon earned his M.A. in history from the University of Massachusetts in 2003. He has published numerous articles in scholarly journals and magazines. Most focus on Union sympathizers in the Civil War South.


He hosts B-List History, a website that features obscure characters and their compelling stories. You may download free pdf versions of his published articles on that website at www.davidtdixon.com.

David's latest book is the biography of German revolutionary and Union General August Willich, published by the University of Tennessee Press in

September 2020. It highlights the contributions of 200,000 German-born immigrants to the Union effort in the Civil War. Transatlantic radicals like Willich viewed the war as part of a much larger, global revolution for social justice and republican government.

Civil Rights to the Colored Man.—The Cumberland Times of the 1st instant, says:—For the first time in the history of this State a colored man has been regularly drawn and summoned to serve on a jury of a State court. Judge Pearre yesterday drew the juries for the next term of the Circuit Court for Garrett county, and among the number appears a colored man of the name of Davis. The first name of this new juror we did not learn but we understand he is an employee of the Messrs. Johnson, of Johnson's district, Garrett county, and is the only colored man in that section.

(L) National Republican (Washington, D.C.), Nov. 14, 1874.

-- Sept. 4, 1875. Judge George A. Pearre, Sr. reviews first ever summon for "colored man" to serve on jury of state court.

With passage of 15th Amendm generation of African-American US Representative & Senators enter halls of Congress, 21 served from 1870 - 1901 MD not represented among states: MD 6th only district remained GOP. Many encouraged Douglass to represent Maryland, including friends, family, politicians.

Douglass actively supported MD Republican party: work w/ MD delegates at National Conventions. MD's 6th District was "battleground" in which Douglass was deeply connected through Cong. (83-91) & Sen. (89-05) Louis McComas of Hagerstown, introducing US Marshal FBD in April 1879 at Wash County Courthouse. Culmination of MD GOP was the election of Gov. Lloyd Lowndes in 1895, a former Congressman, accompanying US Marshal Douglass in Cumberland.

## March Book Report by Matt Borders

REVIEW: David A. Welker, Tempest at Ox Hill – The Battle of Chantilly. 279 pp. Maps, End Notes, \$27.50 (hardcover) ISBN: 978-0306811180 Reviewed by Matthew A. D. Borders

For most students of Civil War history, the Battle of Chantilly is not a fight that immediately comes to mind. Those who are aware of the battle may recall some of its trivia, that it was fought amidst a raging thunderstorm and that it saw the death of two Union generals. While true, these snippets of history do little to enlighten us as to the battle itself. Besides by those who fought at Chantilly, this is how the battle was remembered for 140 years, a footnote, until 2002 when Tempest at Ox Hill was published.

Being fought on September 1, 1862, at the very end of the Northern Virginia Campaign and just three days before the first Confederate invasion of the north began with the Maryland Campaign, Chantilly was quickly swallowed up in the news of the day. The terrible Union defeat at Second Bull Run, the return of George McClellan and the fighting that followed at South Mountain, Harpers Ferry and Antietam. What happened to Union forces after Bull Run though? How did the Union Army of Virginia make it back to the District of Columbia to be amalgamated into the Army of the Potomac? Those were the questions historian David Welker looked to answer with a full battle study of Chantilly.

The opening chapter of Tempest at Ox Hill gives a solid overview of the Civil War in 1862 from the Peninsula Campaign to the Second Battle of Bull Run. A significant portion of this chapter is spent on the fighting at Bull Run as it is important for not only setting the stage for Chantilly, but also introducing the various historic characters. Major General John Pope and his relationship with the War Department in Washington comes under scrutiny, as do the various commanders on both sides. Particularly interesting were the biographical sections on Brigadier General Isaac Stevens and Major General Philip Kearny, two men of action that were rising stars in the Union war effort, but who met their end on the rain swept fields near Ox Hill.

The battle itself, a rear-guard action as the Army of Virginia was attempting to retreat into the defensive perimeter of Washington DC, is very well analyzed using a variety of sources. The Official Records of the War of Rebellion are of limited help for studying this battle as two of the major Union commanders are killed and the primary Confederate commander, Major General Thomas J. Jackson, is also cut down later in the war prior to him writing his report. Instead, the author has utilized extensive writings by the soldiers and officers themselves, their personal, unvarnished writings in letters and journals. This gives an appropriate grittiness to the narrative, making it very readable.

The Chantilly battlefield is not large, but the see-sawing movements of the lines, both on purpose and accident, can make for a confusing read. That is where the well-drawn and placed maps of

Tempest at Ox Hill come into play. various movements of the the almost claustrophobic nature of also crucial to the interpretation of almost entirely developed over.



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Not only do these maps convey the contending troops but help to show this battlefield. These maps are the battlefield as the site itself is Sadly, this bloodied landscape has

a mere four-acre memorial park as the extent of its preservation. The plot is more for the memorial stones commemorating the deaths of Kearny and Stevens then it is for the rest of the battle.




#### 2021 Conference Registration is Now OPEN
