



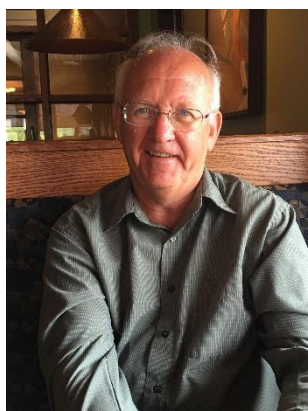

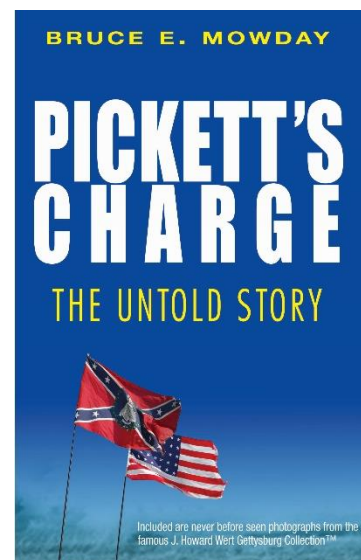


Speaker: Bruce E. Mowday

Presentation Overview: Pickett's Charge – The Untold Story

An ancestor of author Bruce Mowday fought at Gettysburg and was wounded in the Wheatfield. During one of his many visits to the battlefield, Bruce stood at the angle and looked out upon the field where the famed Pickett's Charge took place. Bruce was well versed on the charge but discovered he knew little of the brave Northern defenders that saved the Union that day. Bruce's book was the first detailed account of the repulse of the Southern charge. Bruce's extensive research centered on the Philadelphia Brigade under the command of General Webb, who was awarded a Congressional Medal of Honor. Bruce's talk will recount what the Union defenders faced during that historical even.

BIO Bruce E. Mowday is an award-winning author and newspaper reporter. He has authored 21 books on history, sports, business, and true crime. Mowday has appeared on the Discovery ID channel, *ReelZ* network, C-SPAN, the Pennsylvania Cable Network, Hollywood and Beyond, *Whatcha Got*, *Journey into the Civil War*, *Chronicles of the American Civil War*, and television shows. He is a frequent speaker at various civic and historical groups. The Congress of Civil War Round Tables has named Bruce a "5-Star" speaker. Mowday has hosted his own radio shows, has been editor of magazines and was chairman of the Chester County Historical Society and president of the Brandywine Battlefield Park Associates. He is a former board member of the Valley Forge Park Alliance and the Chester County Conference and Visitors Bureau. In Case you Missed it

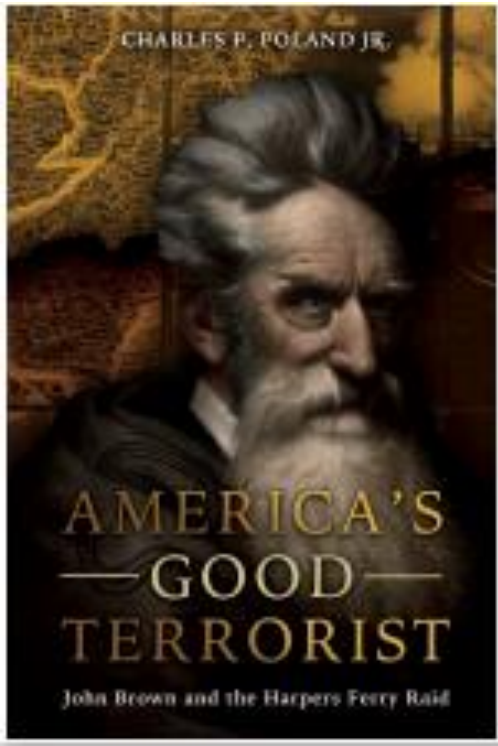


In October Mr. Charles Poland delighted both our on-line and in-person audience recounting the life and times of John Brown, from his colorful childhood, to previous raids on suspected pro-slavery groups, to the famous (perhaps ill-conceived) raid on Harpers Ferry, to his death at the hands of Federal Authorities. Mr. Poland spoke at length on his remarkable work, the first full biography of John Brown, examining his background, why and how he carried out the raid on Harper's Ferry, the aftermath, and the effect his actions had on America.

Charles addressed how the opinions of the historical raid have changed over time and discussed the question of his true status as a

terrorist. Charles walked the audience thru a discussion of his status as a hero, or a martyr, it all depended on one's geography, time period, and perspective. How John

Brown acted and the sum of exactly who he was did in fact fit the profile of a terrorist which we are familiar with today. Charles brought the debate to current terms, touching briefly on the times we live in today. The lesson rings true for most topics, the answer primarily borne from one's own perspective, driven by a number of factors.

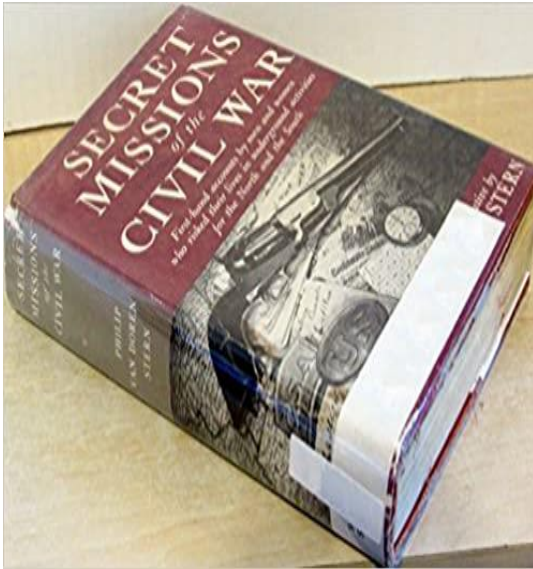

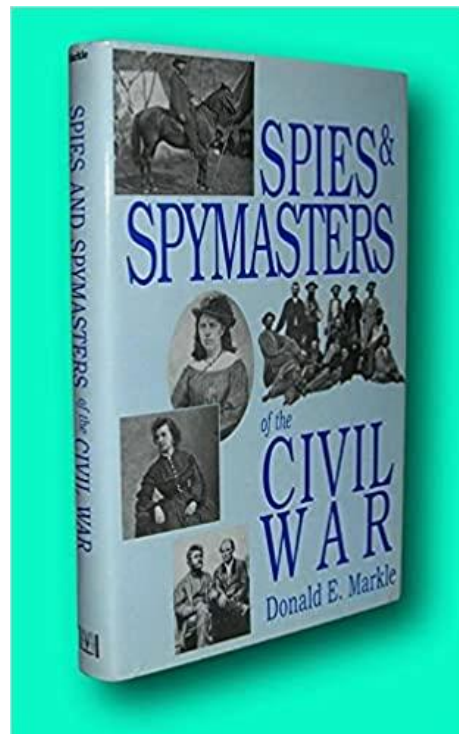

November Book Raffle



This book explores the role of the spy, the commando, the saboteur, the guerilla, and the privateer in the Civil War. Each major conflict has its undercover activities carried out by spies and counterspies whose deeds are often daring. Materials recently released from National Archives has allowed researchers such as Philip Van Doren Stern to learn about the exploits of men's and women's secret operations. Twenty-four stories are captured here, using original source documents, including nine naval tales of espionage and intrigue.

A fresh approach on the topic of civil war spies is Markle's focus on the "new technology" employed by spies to help them to gain information and to disrupt the enemy operations. Markle cites the new photography, telegraphs, and even hot air balloons as means for the saboteurs to gain and manipulate key information to aid military strategists. Women made effective spies as they were less suspect to suspicion and could move about more freely. As an added bonus, this book is signed by the author, Donald E. Markle



2021 Board Positions for the Frederick County Civil War Round Table

For those interested in putting their hat in the ring for a board position for the FCCWRT the position descriptions below were taken from the current by-laws of the round table. Many of these positions have changed or developed with the times since originally written and the current duties of the positions are included here as well. If you are interested in running for a position on the board or volunteering your time to the round table please reach out to the current president, Matt Borders, at mborders@comcast.net.

The President shall: Preside at all meetings of the Roundtable and of the Board of Directors Appoint, with the approval of the Board, the chairperson and members of all committees. Appoint a committee to conduct an audit of the Roundtable's accounts and financial records on an annual basis. (The President currently also plays a big roll in developing and vetting speakers for each season.)

The Vice President shall: Perform the duties of President in his/her absence Perform any special duties assigned by the President.

The Secretary shall: Keep complete and correct minutes of the meetings of the Roundtable and of the Board of Directors. Notify the membership of all meetings and activities of the Roundtable. Prepare and be responsible for the distribution of the Banner of the Blue and Gray newsletter.

The Archivist shall: Safeguard all property and records of the Roundtable and provide an inventory of such property to the Board annually or as directed. (As much of the history of the FCCWRT is available on-line with the newsletter archive, the primary duty of the Archivist has been the safeguarding and distribution of books and items for the meeting raffle.)
