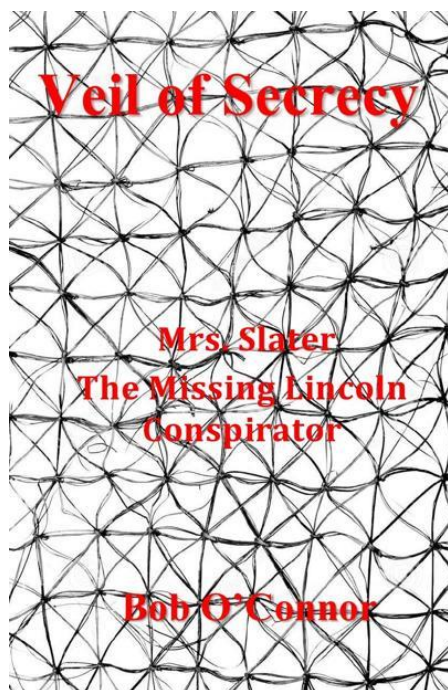

Speaker: Bob O'Connor

Presentation Overview: Mrs. Slater The Missing Lincoln Conspirator

This month, we see both a change in venue and contact as Bob O'Connor tells the roundtable, friends and guests about the story of Mrs. Sarah Slater, a Confederate courier and friend of John Surratt, Jr., who disappeared into thin air while other Lincoln Conspirators were standing trial in Washington. His presentation will be virtual, hosted by our partners at the National Museum of Civil War Medicine as we respond to the resurgence of a COVID variant.

BIO Bob O'Connor is the author of numerous books including ten novels and five non-fiction works including his presentation to the FCCWRT, "The Veil of Secrecy". His current projects include his second children's book

entitled "The Blind Boy Who Helped Save the Union". That book is another collaboration with my fine illustrator, Sheena Hisiro, this follows the success of his previous children's work "I was a Drummer Boy in the American Civil War", the story of the nephew of his great uncle who marched with Sherman's army in his "March to the Sea" as a member of the 105th Illinois Infantry.



In Case you Missed it



In December author David Welker delighted both an in person and virtual audience of members, friends and guests of the Frederick County Civil War Roundtable with his extensive tale of the Battle of Chantilly. David detailed the fight that was one of the rare occasions on which it can be said that GEN “Stonewall” Jackson experienced a bad day, underperforming for GEN Lee in an attempt to trap the Army of the Potomac outside of Washington D.C. in the wake of the Battle of Second Manassas. Briefly on September 1, 1862, portions of two great armies struggled in a conflict wrought with challenge and significance. One army struggled to follow up its Second Battle of Manassas victory, to make that costly fight mean more than just a gain of some Northern Virginia ground. The other sought to save itself, to protect its very existence in the wake of that same battle’s result.

Both armies wrestled against nature’s elements as cannon and musket fire

contrasted vainly to be heard over the thunder and lightning of an intense September storm. Although largely forgotten amidst the larger battles bookending it, the Battle of Chantilly—or Ox Hill, as the Confederates knew it—cost both North and South dearly. Historian and author David A. Welker shared his account of this fascinating action and stories of several of the lives taken in those deadly, rain-soaked September hours.
