



Speaker: Randy Drais

Presentation Overview: Rock Carvings at Gettysburg

One of the more unusual facets of the Gettysburg battlefield is the existence of many rock carvings. Made by soldiers during the battle or by veterans upon their return or by civilians or tourists, rock carvings can be found on many areas of the 6,000 or so acres that encompass the Gettysburg National Military Park.

Looking for rock carvings is an extremely interesting and unusual way to explore the battlefield, but it is also an

extremely interesting and unusual way to discover some of the battlefield history that is often overlooked or quickly forgotten, especially of the personal and often tragic stories of soldiers, both Union and Confederate, who left their mark, both figuratively and literally, on this hallowed ground. Join Randy Drais, amateur Civil War historian and Battle of Gettysburg buff, for a look at many of the rock carvings on the Gettysburg battlefield and the stories behind them.

Speakers Bio: Born and raised in York, Pennsylvania, Randy Drais developed a keen interest in the Battle of Gettysburg and the Gettysburg Campaign immediately after a 5th grade field trip to that famous Civil War battlefield. A lifelong passion to learn more resulted in his creation in March of 2008 of a website, <u>http://battleofgettysburgbuff.com</u>, for individuals who wish to learn and do more than the average visitor to the battlefield. A "companion" Facebook page,

https://www.facebook.com/battleofgettysburgbuff, and a free quarterly newsletter soon followed. A graduate of York College of Pennsylvania with a B.A. in International Studies, Randy worked in the Pennsylvania House of Representatives, the Pennsylvania Senate, and the Pennsylvania Department of State. Married with two daughters, Randy retired on January 1, 2015 and now devotes even more time to his main passion, learning even more about the Battle of Gettysburg and sharing that information with others. He has also co-authored *"Texans at Gettysburg: Blood and Glory with Hood's Texas Brigade"* and is currently providing assistance on a book about a famous former Yorker --- Edman "Ned" Spangler and his life and role in the assassination of President Abraham Lincoln.

Cavalry, Spies and Secret Lines

Matt presented on the important and influential use of spies in Maryland during the Civil War by both Union and Confederate forces. He detailed how Military, Civilian and Private organizations in combination worked to provide their own side the much-needed

information to prosecute their role in the Campaigns of Maryland. The presentation focused primarily on Central Maryland as it was the highway of three separate Confederate invasions and looks at some

of the major personalities both in and out of uniform that were operating throughout the region. The Spy Game in Maryland during the Civil War was a microcosm of the war itself with people of all backgrounds becoming involved in this risky venture. Neighbor distrusted neighbor, and everyone was suspected. Come hear how these first steps in military intelligence gathering led to a professionalization of the practice as the war continued and why many of the nation's players in intelligence today trace their origins to the Civil War.

April Book Review

Touching History with Lincoln's 1858 Time Capsule by Ross E. Heller. Reviewed by: Matthew A. Borders

By Abraham Lincoln reproduces the only book actually hand-written by Lincoln. His words and 19 th century news clips so crisply clear one can almost sand the ink; smell the aroma of his paste. It is a time capsule into the 1858 mindset of the man who became the 16 th President. It was October 18 in the waning days of Lincoln's Senatorial campaign against Stephen A. Douglas when Capt. James N. Brown, a fellow campaigner and personal friend, beseeched him for a clear statement on the "paramount issue" of the day: "Negro equality". Lincoln acceded, annotating what he called a 'scrapbook' with news clips and a definitive 8-page letter. The 'scrapbook' was cherished by Brown and, after his 1868 death, by his sons William and Benjamin. Eventually they sold it to a New York rare-book dealer who found a customer in Philadelphia Lincoln collector William H. Lambert who believed Lincoln's words warranted wider distribution. Thus, a version of the notebook was published in 1901: Abraham Lincoln His Book A Facsimile Reproduction of the Original with an Explanatory Note by J. McCan Davis. After Lambert's death the 'scrapbook' was auctioned in 1914; and purchased for Henry E. Huntington's San Marino, California library.

Now, Lincoln's handwritten words vividly return. Distinguished Lincoln scholar Harold Holzer has provided a historical perspective; and there is an extraordinary 'behind the scenes' peek how the 1901 Facsimile came to be.

Seen through a 21st century lens, Lincoln's statements are what historian Doris Kearns Goodwin called "his complex moral journey to Emancipation." Historian and professor Jon Meacham in his 2022 Lincoln biography "And There Was Light" reprises an 1876 Frederick Douglass quote: "Viewed from the genuine abolition ground, Mr. Lincoln seemed tardy, cold, dull and indifferent: but measuring him by the sentiment of his country, a sentiment he was bound as a statesman to consult, he was swift, zealous, radical and determined."

As the book's title indicates, the scrapbook's contents are a valuable treasure—a true time capsule capturing Lincoln's political pragmatism on race relations; a Time Capsule our generation has the privilege to open 164+ years later.






