Speaker: Scott Mingus

Topic: Civil War Railroads in the Gettysburg Campaign

More than a dozen railroads in Virginia, Maryland and southern Pennsylvania played roles in the 1863 Gettysburg Campaign. These, of course, included the Gettysburg Railroad and its connecting partner, the Hanover Branch Railroad. Starting with the Battle of Brandy Station, discover how railroads influenced the Confederate strategy, Union defensive tactics and the impact on the civilian populace who relied on rail transportation.




Scott Mingus, a retired scientist and executive in the global pulp & paper industry, holds patents in self-adhesive postage stamps and bar code labels. He was part of the research team that developed the first commercially successful self-adhesive U.S. postage stamps. He has written 28 Civil War and Underground Railroad books. His biography of Confederate General William "Extra Billy" Smith was nominated for or won multiple awards, including the Dr. James I. Robertson, Jr. Literary Prize. He also wrote several articles for Gettysburg Magazine and other journals. Scott maintains a blog on the Civil War history of York County PA

(www.yorkblog.com/cannonball) and received the Heritage Profile Award from the York County History Center for his many contributions to local Civil War history. He also has written six scenario books on miniature wargaming and was elected to the hobby's prestigious Legion of Honor. His great-great-grandfather was a 15-year-old drummer boy in the 51st Ohio Infantry, and other family members fought in the Army of the Potomac at Antietam and Gettysburg

October Book Review By Matt Borders

The Demon of Unrest: A Saga of Hubris, Heartbreak, and Heroism at the Dawn of the Civil War by Erik Larson, Crown, 592 pgs., maps, images, notes, \$35.00 (hardcover), ISBN 978-0385348744. Review by Matthew Borders

The story of the American Civil War is so big and so lethal it is easy to forget that it's start, on April 12, 1861, was at a small fort and nearly bloodless. Fortunately, this epic tale has been taken on by one of the nation's premiere narrative history writers, Erik Larson. Larson's use of first person and primary sources to piece together not only the era, but in some cases, the very conversations of the men and women involved is once again masterfully done with his latest work, *The Demon of Unrest*.

As with his previous works, Larson has chosen to look at his subject through the eyes of those who lived the events surrounding the subject. For the United States the perspectives he has gathered include, President Abraham Lincoln, Secretary of State William Seward, Major Robert Anderson and many others both in and out of the military and administration. The fledgling Confederacy is represented by Jefferson Davis, General Pierre G. T. Beauregard, James Chestnut and his wife Mary, as well as many others. These accounts, Federal and Confederate, civilian and military, give the work a well rounded and fair approach when it comes to perspectives.

That does not mean that Larson is downplaying or attempting to sugarcoat the coming conflict and its cause. While giving nearly equal points to each side of the coming war, he does not hesitate to point out the hypocrisies in the enslaving south and its people, particularly the planter class. The inherent evil of the institution of slavery is on full display in many parts of this work, as is its important ties to the economy of the nation at the time. The myth of "King Cotton" had already become entrenched in southern society by the time of the secession crisis and most of the southern aristocracy believed that it held the key to their future.

According to those same aristocrats and firebrands, that future was theirs for the taking! Their cotton and their ambition propelled them to take the step that had been denied John C. Calhoun in 1832 and had seceded from the Union of States. Their honor, wrapped up in the *Code Duello* is utilized by Larson to not only explain that ambition, but to emphasize that the very culture of the aristocracy did not let them back down nor see a different option to tearing the country apart. The depth of detail regarding the build up to and finally the bombardment of Fort Sumter is extraordinary. From tactics and strategy, down to how the men in the ranks feel about all of this is explored. Many of the historic figures in this work also make an appearance in the postscript, allowing Larson to masterfully close his work by describing their lives following the war.

I highly recommend this work for anyone interested in the turmoil of the Secession Crisis, the opening of the Civil War, and the people who lived it.
