Topic: Vermont Brigade in the 6th Corps of the Army of the Potomac - Voices From the Attic: The Williamstown Boys in the Civil War

Imagine clearing out your family attic and discovering an enormous collection of letters written by two soldiers during the Civil War, but not knowing why the letters were there. Faced with that situation, Carleton Young spent more than a decade visiting battlefields and researching the two soldiers as well as other people who appear in the letters. The two brothers were members of the celebrated Vermont Brigade in the 6th Corps of the Army of the Potomac. In *Voices From the Attic: The Williamstown Boys in the Civil War*, he tells the story of these two brothers who witnessed and made history by fighting in the Peninsula Campaign, then at South Mountain, Antietam, Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, Gettysburg, Mine Run, the Bristoe Campaign, the Wilderness, Petersburg, and Cedar Creek. They then preserved that history through their surprisingly detailed and insightful letters.



Carleton Young has undergraduate degrees in economics from Westminster College and in English from Point Park University, an MA in history from Ohio University, and his PhD in the history of education from the University of Pittsburgh. For 37 years he taught AP American history at Thomas Jefferson High School in Pittsburgh. He has also taught classes as an adjunct professor at the Community College of Allegheny County, the University of Pittsburgh, Eastern Gateway Community College, and in the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Carnegie Mellon University

In Case You Missed It...

October 16th, 2025

Scott Mangus spoke on October 16th to the FCCWRT on the topic of railroads (RR) during the war. Scott has written 28 Civil War books on commercial and the underground railroads. His great-great-grandfather was a 15-year-old drummer boy in the 51st Ohio Infantry, and other family members fought in the Army of the Potomac at Antietam and Gettysburg.



Gettysburg was one of the last places to get their own RR line in 1858 and their train made two daily trips to Hanover Junction. Mangus noted that an element of Robert E. Lee's plan for the PA invasion was to disrupt railroads. Although William T. Sherman is given the credit for "Sherman neckties" – disrupting rail lines by removing the metal rails and twisting them around nearby trees – the technique was actually used earlier by Confederate Albert Jenkins who used this method when destroying the Martinsburg B&O RR.

Regular service on that RR did not resume until 1864. Jenkins is said to have dropped into a bar in Mechanicsburg, ordered ice water, and leisurely read the Harrisburg News which informed him of all local bridges and who was guarding them. George Pickett's men tore up the RR tracks at Cumberland Valley and the task wore them out. Perhaps this fatigue contributed to their defeat during the famous Pickett's charge.

November Book Review By Matt Borders

Last Flag Down: The Epic Journey of the Last Confederate Warship by John Baldwin & Ron Powers, Crown, 354 pgs., notes, index, glossary, \$25.95 (hardcover), ISBN 978-0307236555. Review by Matthew Borders

While the Naval history of the American Civil War has been an under studied element of the war, the exploits of the Confederate Navy, particularly its ironclads, the *Hunley* and its commerce raiders are well documented. Though the Confederate Army did succeed, for a time, in keeping multiple armies in the field, it struggled continuously with a navy. Unable to compete with the expanding and modernizing Federal Navy in fleet actions, the Confederate Navy Department chose to lean into technologies. This allowed for some brief, but dramatic, means to combat the much larger and organized foe. The commerce raiders *CSS Alabama*, *CSS Florida* and others, became legends in their own time, while one vessel sailed further and caused more late war headache than any other for United States shipping, the *CSS Shenandoah*.

Though only active from October 1864 to November 1865, the exploits of the *Shenandoah* were seen by many in the increasingly desperate Confederacy as flashes of hope, or at least revenge, as the rebellion crumbled around them. Authors John Baldwin and Ron Powers have crafted a wonderful history of the famous raider, from its earliest days as the English built *Sea King*, to being literally the last belligerent flag of the Confederacy. The book, however, is not just about the vessel itself and instead focuses primarily on two members of the *Shenandoah's* crew. It's captain, James Waddel, an old seafarer with experience in the United States Navy before the war and its executive officer, Conway Whittle. Whittle was a much younger man and had prior service with the United States Navy. He had seen action with several Confederate raiders and warships prior to being posted to *Shenandoah*, and the personality clashes between the two officers proved to be significant, and at times disruptive to the operation of the vessel.

The first half of the book dwells upon these men, their crew and trials of literally sneaking the *Sea King* out of Liverpool, England, rechristening her the *Shenandoah*, as well as her earliest exploits. The *Shenandoah* initially was chronically undermanned and resourced, meaning that it had to take opposing ships just to stay provisioned and even went so far as to offer and sign up crew from captured vessels. The specifics of these captures, the nature of the plunder and the development of the *CSS Shenandoah's* crew were all extensively documented in the logs of executive officer Conway Whittle. This fantastic resource allowed the authors, and it should be noted that Baldwin is a relative of Whittle, to track the day-to-day life on board the commerce raider. This included everything from routine chores and drills to discipline and of course, captures. It also propels Whittle to being the main character of the history, and it is his thoughts and words that guide most of the narrative for <u>Last Flag Down</u>.

As such, some of his enthusiasm and bias do come out in the work and there are several points throughout the book that you get the feeling Baldwin and Powers are rooting for Whittle. This is apparent in the clashes between Whittle and Waddel, as well as his desire to strike out on his own, and as the book moves into its climactic raid against United States whalers, you can feel the authors have the same excitement as Whittle to do as much damage as possible to Federal shipping.

By the end of the work the *CSS Shenandoah* has returned to Liverpool, having been informed that the war is over and fearing that their exploits could be then seen as piracy. This fascinating chapter in Civil War naval history is well worth the read and I highly recommend it.
